Foreword to My Dear Young Friends Saint John Paul II Edition

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On 4 July 2013, Pope Francis confirmed the canonization of Blessed Pope John Paul II. On 27 April 2014, the world will celebrate what was known in the hearts of millions since the day of his death: John Paul II is a saint of the Church for the world. It is fitting that the bestowing of his canonization is granted by Pope Francis. The two seem to be soul mates of sorts. Both men demonstrate a profound, authentic love for and hope in the youth of the world. For both, Jesus is the heart of their love and hope.

Saint John Paul II is now your special friend in Heaven. He would have loved you as much as he loved all the young people of the world that he met during the twenty-six years of his papacy. He would have believed in you. He would have called you to follow Christ without fear, just as he called the millions of young people who gathered with him at every World Youth Day and at special gatherings throughout his papacy.

Now, residing among the saints and angels in Heaven, he continues to be your advocate before God the Father and receives your prayers of intercession. Do not be afraid to pray to Christ, who, Saint John Paul II taught us, is our "inseparable friend." Your prayers will be heard.

Saint John Paul II was fifty-eight years old when he was elected Pope of the Church. He was eighty-four years old when he died, while Pope, on 2 April 2005. He passed away at 9:37 in the evening in his private apartment at the Vatican, in Rome.

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His body finally succumbed to the Parkinson's disease that left him voiceless in his final days. Yet on Easter Sunday, just a few days before his death, he insisted on going to the window overlooking Saint Peter's Square and blessing the tens of thousands of believers who had gathered, in part to celebrate Easter Sunday and in part to hold vigil for the Holy Father's imminent death.

Reverent silence fell upon the enormous crowds gathered in Saint Peter's Square at the announcement of the Holy Father's passing. A single bell of Saint Peter's Basilica tolled. Only moments later the crowd began to applaud, a tradition in Italy to acclaim the greatness of a life lived in service of God. Then the shouts began to ring out: "Santo Subito," meaning "make him a saint immediately." What the world saw in his life on earth the Church now confirms. At the funeral Mass, Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger referred to the Holy Father as John Paul II the Great, acknowledging the cries of the Church to recognize the extraordinary faith of this servant of God. On 1 May 2011, Pope Benedict XVI bestowed upon John Paul II beatification, and the Church received him as Blessed John Paul II. Now the Church confirms his place among the canon of saints. Today the Church and the world welcome Saint John Paul II with great joy.

Through the intercession of Saint John Paul II, may the words of this little book, the words of Saint John Paul II, lead you to a greater, deeper love of Christ and your neighbor.

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Pope John Paul II first addressed the youth of the world in his apostolic letter *Dilecti Amici*, in 1985. Since then he has addressed youth nearly every year for World Youth Day. Every other year young people from all over the world pilgrimage to a different place of the globe in response to the Holy Father's invitation to attend World Youth Day. Pope John Paul II has a deep affection and love for young people. Undoubtedly, you—young people throughout the world—hold a special place in Pope John Paul II's heart. He has an extraordinary interest in you. Moreover, he believes in you—in your hunger for God and in your desire to do good things in the world.



You, perhaps like no other generation, are growing up in a world of rapid and constant change. Yet, in this world of change, you can find in Pope John Paul II's words an unwavering constancy. His message is a lasting message of love and encouragement. He will both affirm your goodness and challenge you to greater things.

The Holy Father's desire for you—for all young people around the world—is clear: Draw close to Christ so that you may participate, with the whole community of believers, in the great task of transforming the world according to God's design, of creating a world where the love of God directs all things! John Paul II believes in you as a young person. He is convinced that in Christ you have the ability to make this world a better place. Through your friendships, your family, your work, your school, and your athletic, artistic, and intellectual talents, you can spread the Good News of God's love in ways that only a young person can.

This is why each time that John Paul II addresses young people, he calls out in a special, heartfelt way, "My dear young friends!" His is a friendship with you that is rooted in the Good News of Christ's love. In addressing the youth of Poland in June 1997, John Paul II said: "Dear young people, follow Christ with the enthusiasm of your youthful hearts. He alone can calm [your] fear. Look to Jesus from the depths of your hearts and minds! He is your inseparable friend." This message is just as meaningful to you today as it was to the Polish teens in 1997. *My Dear Young Friends* provides you with fifty-two weekly reflections on the Holy Father's words. You will find a quote from the Holy Father for each week of the year. These are the words he would say to you if you were to meet him face-to-face. They are powerful words. They are words that affirm you, challenge you, and call you to a deep and profound love for Christ through his Church.

Think About That

Each quote is followed by a section titled "Think About That." When you come to this section, pause to think about what the Holy Father has to say to you. Imagine that he is speaking these words directly to you. What do his words mean to you? What is he teaching you?

Take Action

Following each "Think About That" section, you will find a challenge to "Take Action." These actions are important to carry out. Why? They're important because the Christian life is one of both word and deed. What good does it do to be inspired by the words of our Holy Father but not to integrate them into the way you live your life? The actions do not take a lot of time, but they will help to change your life.

Say a Prayer

The Holy Father also wishes that you pray over matters of faith and life. Each week's reflection provides a prayer. Use this prayer each day of the week to keep the words of the Holy Father fresh in your mind and heart. Finally, the "Did you know?" section offers you some trivia about the Pope's life and ministry. This information will help you come to know the Pope in a more practical and personal way.

May the words of our Holy Father inspire you and enliven in your heart a burning fire for the Good News of Jesus Christ!

To live in a world where we experience Christian ideals like kindness, patience, peace, forgiveness, and joy takes people who first believe in those ideals and then commit to acting JZ 2

out those ideals every day. That's no easy task. The Holy Father is asking us, "Is it worth it?" He says, "Yes!"

Take Action

Every day, in many ways, we fail to live out our Christian ideals. Each time we fail, we cause a little "death," or pain and sorrow, in someone and in ourselves. This week, choose one Christian ideal that you are going to work hard to live out in every situation and with every person that you meet.

Say a Prayer

Lord, help me to live out the ideals of Jesus. Help me especially when others make fun of me or tease me for standing up for what I believe in. Help me to know that it's worth the work.

Did you know? The Pope has numerous official titles, including bishop of Rome, vicar of Jesus Christ, successor of the prince of the Apostles, supreme pontiff of the universal church, patriarch of the West, primate of Italy, archbishop and metropolitan of the Roman province, sovereign of the state of the Vatican City, servant of the servants of God. Remember the poor.

Take Action

This week, find at least three articles of clothing in your closet or dresser or on your bedroom floor that you don't need. Take them to a place in your town that provides clothing to poor people.

Say a Prayer

Lord, help me to love poor people, and not to look on them as second-class citizens. Help me to give of myself so that they may have what they need to live.

This week, think of something kind you can do for your next-door neighbor. Then do it!

Lord, thank you for living next door to me in my neighbor's home. Help me to see you there. Help me to be kind and good to my neighbors, because you are living there with them.
