

## About the Total Youth Ministry Series

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This six-manual series builds on the bishops' vision of youth ministry as outlined in "Renewing the Vision: A Framework for Catholic Youth Ministry" (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, 1997). Offering a rich and challenging vision for Catholic youth ministry, the bishops urge the Church to guide young people toward a life of fullness in Jesus Christ, and to give them the tools to live out that fullness as Catholic Christians.

Whether your parish has five teens or five hundred, this series provides a strong foundation for a year-round, total youth ministry program that aims to empower young people to be disciples of Christ and to bring them fully into the life of the Church.

# Our Human Rights: The Basics

All human beings, because they are created in the image and likeness of God, are created with a dignity that can never be taken away. It is a dignity we must help to protect. This dignity means that all human beings have a right to certain things. They have a right to:

- life
- food
- clothing
- decent and affordable housing
- have a family and the ability to take care of it
- a good education
- work (and to be paid enough to live decently)
- respect
- a good reputation
- privacy
- act according to their conscience
- freedom, including freedom of religion

# Community-Building Event

## Preparation Steps for a Successful Event

- Practice the community-building activity ahead of time, and become familiar with all dimensions of the activity.
- Review the role of the small-group leaders, and prepare them for their facilitator role.
- Gather all supplies needed for the event.
- Set up the physical space as needed for the selected activities.

### Small Groups

If your group has more than ten participants, be sure to include small-group work. The participants can be placed in small groups in many different ways.

Because it is essential that participants feel affirmed for their participation, it will be important to have a trained leader with the small groups. This person sets the tone for how the members of the group will interact with each other, encourages participation, and affirms group members. How will you divide people into groups?

### Welcome

The participants need to know immediately that they are valued and that you are glad they are there. How will you welcome participants? Will you provide name tags?

## Getting-Started Activities

To begin a program, select at least one icebreaker. Icebreakers are team-building activities that often involve physical activity, simple problem-solving activities, and group work.

## Opening Up

Once you have a general level of comfort in the large group, help the participants begin sharing information about themselves. This can be done by having the participants give a verbal response, raise their hand in affirmation of an idea, or move from one side of a room to the other. Another option is for the participants to gather in a small-group setting, and use open-ended sentences, discussion questions, or activities.

## Stretching

Introduce a challenging activity to the participants that requires that they work together to accomplish a task. Trust activities, simulation games, or group puzzles are an effective way to help groups develop a level of trust with one another. It is important to match the activity to the level of trust that you believe will be possible at this point in your event.

### Celebration

Assuming that a group has successfully accomplished a task that involved stretching and growing in trust, celebrate that event! Food, naming the group, prizes, skits, and storytelling about their accomplishments are good ways of celebrating. If the group did not succeed, they may still want to celebrate their attempts.

### Deeper Sharing

By the end of an event, some participants may be ready to share on a deeper level. Other groups may not get to a level of trust that would allow for this deeper level of sharing. Providing opportunities for the participants to share personally with others in the group through small-group discussions, one-on-one conversations, and group activities can be effective with groups where trust has been developed.

### Closing

Close the evening with either the preceding celebration or in some other way, such as extending an invitation to other youth or to intergenerational events happening at the parish, in the community, or at a larger level. Encourage the participants to continue to build community outside of this event. Prayer is an important way to celebrate the community that has been built, and provides a fitting end to the program.
